
I hope to see all of you at Our Next Club meeting on August 9th.

Indian Pass Campground ~ by Chris Graves

For over 40 years I have ignored Indian pass campground on my way to taking the kids to Cape San Blas for our annual spring break camping trip.

Coming from Apalach on 30A you take a left at the Indian Pass Raw Bar, about 10 minutes later you arrive at the campground. The sites are very rustic, no pavement, just sand and shells. Fifth wheels or anything over 24 feet would be challenging to maneuver into a site. A great deal of leveling may be needed. On the plus side there are several sites at a good elevation overlooking St. Vincent Island.

The site next to me on the water has a nice shot on south west or north west winds. In discussions with the long time visitors the water is uniformly deep with no hidden surprises. There is a boat ramp next to the campground, the boat ramp is county maintained and I believe there is a fee. There is also amble free boat storage at the campground. Most sites seem to be 30 amps with water but no sewer connection. They have a mobile clean-out service for \$15. The bathrooms are adequate. Tenters are welcome; very laid back place. Prices are \$50 for water view and \$45 for the rest.



There are cabins, which I did not review. Two cabins are open and the other three are under going renovation. Prices are \$180 or \$140 depending on amenities.

Saint Vincent Island

The campground is very close to Saint Vincent Island National Wildlife Refugee, a 12,500 acre wilderness on an island roughly 9 by 4 miles in size. The island itself is less than 1000 feet from the campground, but does traverse some rapidly moving tidal waters. Awesome spot to boat or kayak on the bay side. Indian shell middens are all along the backside of the island. Zanzibar deer, gators, panthers, red wolves, bears, wild hogs await on the island. The island does close a few times in the fall to allow hunting. Dogs are not allowed on St. Vincent Island.
